That time away was exactly what I needed to grow spiritually. In discerning the priesthood I actually was preparing myself for marriage.

Eventually, I bumped into that girl a few more times — having no idea the pain she was enduring. After many long talks, we went from being friends to dating. Now, Kate and I are married.


Looking back, I can see God's plan. My time away made me a better person, husband, and father. But the way I handled things and the way it was received were far from ideal.





Chapter Four

There is a lot of pressure to be in a relationship. The examples of relationships on TV, in movies, and in magazines are physical, often making it seem like being physical with a guy isn't a big deal, that everyone is doing it, or you are weird if you wait. Some of the pressure comes from peers. Sometimes it might be hormones. But what if these relationships are like caffeine and aren't satisfying our deprivation and dehydration?

Someday you will sit down with your future husband and talk about your past relationships. Don't

let a guy pressure you into something you will regret. If he does not respect you enough to wait until marriage, he probably will not respect you after you are married.

Kate and I had the privilege of being friends for five years before we started dating. This allowed us to get to know each other, without putting ourselves in situations that could lead to sexual temptations. Besides pregnancy, STDs, higher divorce rates, etc., we wanted to follow God's plan for marriage, if He would call us to that. While dating, we didn't want to pretend to be married and use intimacy intended to bond married couples until we were married. It certainly wasn't easy, but we have never regretted waiting.

Perhaps you have already made mistakes. It is never too late to start over. From this day forward, commit to a new beginning. It will be great to one day tell your future spouse, "Yes, I made mistakes, but years ago I realized this, and I have remained pure for you since that point." The gift of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is waiting for you so you can start over today. I love Confession!


Maybe you put up with bad relationships because you think it is better than being alone. That's a dangerous game to play. You might say, "Yes, Kyle, but I want to have kids. I want to be married." To which I would reply, "You're talking to a book. I can't hear you." But what about what God wants? Do you trust Him? Do you really think that God would call you to something that would make you miserable? If He is calling you to be a sister, it's because that is what will bring you joy and peace (John 10:10). If God is calling you to marriage, remaining open to being a religious sister will prepare you for marriage better than anything. Dating a guy doesn't mean you will get married, and visiting a convent doesn't mean you will take vows as a sister. Maybe you want to try a "nun-run," where you grab some of your lady friends and visit a few convents over a weekend or week. I promise that it will be a great experience. You might find a pull inside you to the life of a religious sister; maybe you will grow in your faith or learn a new way to pray, which will help your future marriage.

The pressure to get married is everywhere. From the time girls are very young, many of them start dreaming about their wedding day. I, as a guy, am challenging you to be open to another call. The majority of you will be called to marry amazing, yet very flawed men (like Kate did). But some of you will be called to take Jesus as your spouse, and nothing will make you as happy as being the bride of Christ.

Do you trust God? Either way, one of the best ways to prepare for your future spouse is to explore being a religious sister or nun.

Question: Think honestly. Are you open to being a sister or nun? Have you shut that door? Or are you trying to close it? Are you trusting God's plan for your life?

Challenge: Visit some sisters or nuns for an hour, day, or weekend. Pray that you would be open to any vocation God has for you.

Chapter Six

Before our teacher started, he told us a story.

He reminisced about his first year of teaching and the first test that he gave. When the students got their test results, everyone had done poorly, and they were frustrated.

He quieted them down, and first asked the ladies why they did poorly. Several answered with comments like, "I should have studied harder," or, "I should have done more practice problems."

The professor then asked the guys why they didn't score well. Their answers were unanimous: "Because you didn't prepare us."

It was confirmation to what he had thought. The

Men might be physically violent at times, but women are violent to each other and to themselves. The words they tell others and speak internally can be as damaging as physical violence. My wife is always trying to convince me that she is unattractive. When I disagree, and say that she looks great, she thinks I'm lying.

It is important that you have some girl friends that lift you up instead of tear you down. Spend time doing things that build your self-esteem, like service work, ministry groups, prayer, and reading the Bible. Don't be afraid to talk to a priest, youth minister, parent, counselor, or doctor to help you if you are depressed. Expecting a boyfriend to fill the void of self-esteem will leave you both frustrated.

There isn't anything that you can do that will make

God stop loving you, and there isn't anything you can do to make God love you more. You don't have to earn His perfect love.

If a guy can't respect you for who you are — the way God made you — then slash his tires. I mean, dump him, and pray for him.

Question: Have you taken blame for something that wasn't your fault? In what ways are you hard on yourself?

Challenge: Let people compliment you, and when they do, don't disagree. Instead say, "Thank you." Then, remember the compliments when you are feeling down.

Chapter Seven

LET THE GUY ASK YOU
